MANITOWANING FALL FAIR GENERAL RULES

The privilege of membership is open to all residents of Ontario.

Membership can be obtained for \$5.00 ages 14 and up and for \$3.00 for juniors ages 13 and under, from any Director at any time.

From the sum or sums awarded to each exhibitor as a prize or prizes, the Treasurer shall retain a sum of \$5.00 or \$3.00 for membership for the following year.

If for any reason the receipts of the fair are insufficient to cover all expenses and prize money, then all the expenses will be paid first, and prize money will be reduced and paid equally to each entitled exhibitor on a percentage basis.

No prize will be awarded if the article or animal is not considered worthy of a prize by the judge.

All prizes are to be accepted as donated or awarded and not exchanged.

All complaints must be submitted in writing to the Secretary within seven days of the fair. In cases where disputes have arisen and have been deferred to the Directors, the decision of the Directors shall be final.

All exhibits in the arena must be properly ticketed before submitting them for judging.

The exhibit building opens at 8:30 a.m. on Friday and the doors are locked at 11:30 a.m. The exhibits can also be brought in on Thursday night between 7:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. All animals and fowl must be in their pens on the grounds before 12:00 p.m., with entry forms, on the Saturday of the fair.

The judges will commence to award the prizes for the articles in the building at 12:30 p.m. Friday and at 12:00 p.m. on Saturday, for livestock and poultry unless otherwise stated.

Only ONE entry is allowed for each individual section in each class except in the Livestock and Poultry classes.

During the inspection of any of the exhibits, **NO PERSON WILL BE ALLOWED TO INTERFERE WITH THE JUDGE**, nor will they be allowed to go near them except for directors and helpers for the category being judged.

Any person wishing to change a ticket due to a mistake must only do so with attendance of an official and only before judging begins.

All exhibitors and their helpers MUST have the exhibit number visible when removing their exhibits.

EXHIBITS CANNOT BE REMOVED UNTIL SATURDAY AT 3:00 P.M.

THE FAIR CLOSES AT 3:30 PM.

IF A MISTAKE IS FOUND ON THE STATEMENT WITHIN SEVEN DAYS OF RECEIPT OF THE CHEQUE, RETURN ALL PAPERS AND CHEQUES TO THE SECRETARY SO THAT CORRECTIONS CAN BE MADE.

All cheques must be cashed within six months of issue.

Directors and Officers of the Society will NOT be responsible for the loss or damage of the exhibits.

In the event a business donating a special prize goes bankrupt and cannot supply the prize, the Society will award a prize of equal value.

If more than one entry form is used, please number the pages (ie Page 1 of 4).

EXHIBITS MAY BE SHOWN FOR ONE YEAR ONLY, EXCEPT FOR QUILTS WHICH MAY BE SHOWN FOR THREE CONSECUTIVE YEARS.

ANY PERSON FOUND GUILTY OF VIOLATING ANY PART OF THE RULES WOULD FORFEIT THE WHOLE OF THEIR PRIZE MONEY.

In the event of a tie in points, the greater number of Firsts shall decide the winner.

Anyone wishing to sell their exhibits must provide their own table and do so outside the Arena after 3:00 p.m. on Saturday.

ALL EXHIBITS MUST BE MADE, GROWN OR TENDED BY THE EXHIBITORS, OTHERWISE THEY WILL BE DISQUALIFIED.

Prize money will be paid as soon as possible.

The Society will not be held liable for any accident that happens at the Fair.

LIVESTOCK RULES

The following rules pertain to the handling, classification, judging, etc. of all livestock at the fair for general and special prizes.

All livestock must be on the fair ground by 12:00 noon Saturday.

To be eligible to enter livestock in the fair, the exhibitor must:
Be or become a member of the Manitowaning Agricultural Society, submit to the secretary or other designated official by 12:00 noon, a completed entry form covering all livestock entered. Entry forms are available from the society. Completed entry tags must be carried by competitor.

Wherever possible, livestock will be judged in the order they appear in the prize list.

Multiple entries: Each major category (i.e. CATTLE) is divided into classes and each class may have one or several sections. Exhibitors may enter more than one entry in a given livestock section provided this is not specifically prohibited in the write-up of the class or section in the prize list.

Exhibitors may not enter a single entry in more than one section of any class. (This does not apply to breeding herds).

Exhibitors may enter an entry in more than one class.

Registration papers: It is not necessary to bring registration papers to the fair on fair day unless they are specifically requested in the write-up of the class or section.

However, if requested by the directors of the society, registration papers should be available within seven days following the fair.

All exhibitors are asked to exercise care and caution in handling animals on the fair grounds. All driving and riding of animals should be no faster than walking speed unless where required on exhibition in the show ring.

All animals must be tied or confined unless being handled or led by a capable exhibitor.

Stallions and bulls must be tied and handled by a person over sixteen years of age.

Horses may be removed from the grounds any time after they are judged.

Any animal entered incorrectly in a class will be permitted to enter the proper class provided that class has not already been judged.

Exhibitors entering purebred stock must give the names and registration numbers in the entry form. For young purebred not yet registered, the names and numbers of the sire and dam are required.

SAFETY RULES FOR ALL HORSE CATEGORIES

All waivers must be signed and submitted before the rider is mounted.
All exhibitors are asked to exercise care and caution in handling animals on the fair grounds.

No horse shall be ridden faster than a walk unless it is in the show ring.

PLEASE! NO STALLIONS allowed on the fairgrounds or in the parade.

All riders under the age of 18 must wear a properly fitting ASTM approved helmet with harness and secure footwear with heel at all times when mounted in the ring as well as on the grounds. Those participants over 19 must wear secure footwear with heel at all times when mounted in the ring as well as on the grounds, helmets are strongly recommended. This dress code will be strictly enforced and will be checked.

The competitor's number must be visible at all times. The number must be on the rider while the rider is mounted in the holding area or being shown. Neither sponsors, nor the organizing committee, nor the Manitowaning Agricultural Society will be held responsible for any damage, injury or loss to persons, property or horses of the exhibitors or the spectators.

Please note that the Ag Society membership fees do not cover participation in the horse show.

ANNUAL HAND QUILTED CHAMPIONSHIP QUILT COMPETITION

Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies

Each local fair is entitled to send only the Grand Champion Quilt, (judged the best of show of all eligible hand quilted quilts) to the District Competition

OR

If any entry wins Grand Champion or Best of All Eligible Quilts at more than one fair, the other fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, should enter their Reserve Champion or Second Best of Show of All Classes quilt in the District Competition.

NOTE: if an Exhibitor wins Grand Champion or Best of Show of All Eligible quilts at other his/her own fair, or at more than one Fair, the Exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest his/her home address as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the District Meeting.

An Exhibitor who wins more than one Best of Show title with a different quilt at different Fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning quilt to compete at the District Competition.

Entries must be solely made and quilted by a group or an individual and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association Agricultural Societies Fair to be eligible for this competition.

Entry quilts must be a minimum 324 inch perimeter. Smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next level of competition.

Upon making an entry into the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Quilt Competition, the exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.

The winning OAAS Convention Champion Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or Convention OAAS competition.

ANNUAL MACHINE-QUILTED CHAMPIONSHIP QUILT COMPETITION

1. All of the above regulations apply except these quilts must be solely made and MACHINE quilted by the individual entering same.
2. The quilt must not be quilted using a long arm machine and must be machine quilted by the exhibitor.
3. Quilt must have visible machine quilting

Directions are for size X-Small; changes for sizes Small, Medium and Large are in parentheses.

Finished Circumference Measurement:
18 (20, 22-24)" [46 (51, 56, 61) cm]

HAT

With smaller needles, cast on 82 (90, 100, 108) sts.

Knit 1 row.

Next Row (Right Side): Knit.

Next Row: Purl

Repeat last 2 rows until piece measures 2 (2, 2, 2½)" [5 (5, 5, 6) cm] from beginning, end with a right side row.

Change to larger needles and knit 1 row on wrong side.

Work 4 rows in St st.

Knit 4 rows (2 ridges).

Next Row: [K3, k2tog] 11 (12, 13, 14)

times - 44 (48, 52, 56) sts.

Knit 1 row.

Next Row: [K2, k2tog] 11 (12, 13, 14)

times - 33 (36, 39, 42) sts.

Knit 1 row.

Next Row: [K1, k2tog] 11 (12, 13, 14)

times - 22 (24, 26, 28) sts.

Knit 1 row.



Next Row: [K2tog] 11 (12, 13, 14) times - 11 (12, 13, 14) sts.

Knit 1 row.

Next Row: [K2tog] 5 (6, 6, 7) times, k1 (0, 1, 0) - 6 (6, 6, 7) sts.

Next Row: [K2tog] 3 times, k0, (0, 0, 1) - 3 (3, 3, 4) sts.

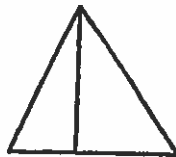
