**CALL MEETING TO ORDER**

Dale SCOTT called the meeting to order at 7:04 p.m.

Wayne BAILEY mentioned that he had been speaking with Mike MANTHA about Bill 175. Mike Mantha states that he is very aware that the Bill does not fit Northern Ontario. It will work great for large cities but not small communities in Northern Ontario. Mr. MANTHA is attending a meeting of Mayors and Council of Northern Ontario in the future and this will be discussed.

**NEW BUSINESS**

**Bridal Veil Falls - Parking**

S/Sgt. WEBB attended Billings Council Meeting last evening. He stated that the meeting went very well. He indicated that council members were under the interpretation that officers can ticket cars. This is not the case. Officer needs a driver in order to lay a charge. Municipality has requested enforcement, so enforcement will be provided. Cost of parking ticket is \$40.00. A committee is going to be constructed with partners from the OPP, MTO and community. Sgt. PATTERSON will represent the OPP on this committee. Cst. FORD who speaks on the radio weekly will bring some attention to the area, speaking about the signage, cost of ticket etc. Through social media the word will get out that tickets are being issued.

Hugh MOGGY asked about placing a billboard as you enter the community showing parking area. Cost of ticket for not parking in the designated area. Brian PARKER said MTO may not allow a billboard to be erected.

### COMMUNITY STREET CRIME UNIT

S/Sgt. Webb advised that there was a competition for a permanent full-time street crime/drug strategy member. The position has now been filled and member is doing a great job. This member will continue to share resources with our First Nation partners. They meet often and share ideas and support each other. Seeing great results.

Cst. FORD is our main policing partner within Manitoulin Secondary School. Each of our four platoons has one member who liases with MSS. We want the students to gravitate and feel comfortable in speaking with Cst. FORD. She has managed to deal with things before they have become a problem and this is tremendous.

Officers enjoy taking part in school trips, ski trip, canoe trip etc.

Dale SCOTT asked what will happen when marihuana becomes legalized. S/Sgt. Webb stated it is going to be nothing different than alcohol – age restrictions will cover most students. It will be the same as liquor.

### STAFFING

Cst. MELLAN will be retiring April 30<sup>th</sup> after 30 years of policing. When members retire their spots are easily filled. Manitoulin is a duration posting so a member must commit to 5 years but most stay much longer than 5 years.

Cst. ST. MARSEILLE is transferring from Espanola to Sudbury. His replacement is an experienced officer coming from Kirkland Lake.

Cst. MAKORT is transferring from Manitoulin to Lanark County.

Sgt. CORRIGAN is retiring May 31.

Rachel SKIPPEN was successful candidate in getting the Detachment Administrative contract position at the Gore Bay Detachment. Therefore, doors are open again in Gore Bay. She will provide court support to Cst. Steve REDMOND as well.

Hugh MOGGY asked if Cst. MELLAN's replacement would be assigned to Manitowaning? S/Sgt. WEBB stated Yes.

### ROUND TABLE

Brian Parker – stated no complaints from Billings

Eric RUSSELL – stated they are very unhappy with the OPP in relation to missing township file investigation. Also, unhappy with the write up in the Expositor in relation to this case. Concerned about Tehkummah Councillors who are being interviewed by the OPP.

Would like to see some police presence in Tehkummah, as there is a speeding issue and not stopping at the stop sign continues to be an issue. S/Sgt. WEBB advised that he would send out an email to all members requesting they attend the Township of Tehkummah looking for speeders and persons going through stop sign.

Yvonne BAILEY stated all is good in Gore Bay

Wayne BAILEY – all is good in Burpee/Mills

Hugh MOGGY indicated Assiginack is happy with the police presence they are seeing in the community. S/Sgt. WEBB mentioned each municipality where there is a school or hospital will naturally see more police presence.

Dale SCOTT mentioned Central Manitoulin has a few ongoing issues. Firstly, he wanted to express his admiration for the officers who live in the community. They have all become part of the community by attending local churches, children at local schools, sports etc. The community respects the job they have to do, officers seem to be able to take the good with the bad. S/Sgt. WEBB stated the officers are very passionate about the communities where they live.

Mr. SCOTT talked about partnership with assisted living complex across the street from Mindemoya hospital. Commitment for a side walk on the highway in this area. MTO will advise if this can happen. A crosswalk to the hospital would be beneficial as well. Speed Limit reduction from 70 km at Ketchankookem down to 50 km through the town. A second crosswalk at the corner is still an ongoing discussion. Working with MTO has become easier over the last couple of years. S/Sgt. WEBB stated he understands the issues at the corner, he supports the proactive efforts by the council.

People are not abiding by the No Parking Signs in front of the arena again, so pylons are back out. The pylons work well.

**Presentations:**

1. Rob Campbell, Assistant Deputy minister, Ontario Northland Transportation Commission, Ministry of Northern Development and Mines presented the proposed Intercommunity Bus Service Improvements in Northern Ontario that will provide bus service to a large portion of Manitoulin Island. The program will support municipalities, indigenous communities and other organizations throughout the province to provide more travel options in areas that are not served or underserved by public transportation and intercommunity bus. This service will help connect passengers from smaller

communities to regional centers that offer essential services, such as health care and education. The 30 passenger bus service is to start in March of 2018.

2. Angela Spears and Mike Shantz from Northern911 presented a proposal to the MMA to provide the Island municipalities with Fire dispatch. They have experience providing the 911 answering service and they have provided fire dispatch for approximately 63 years. It would be beneficial to have one main body as an umbrella to all Island municipalities to make the cost viable as the current minimum monthly fee rate is \$200.00 per municipality. They hoped the Manitoulin Municipal Association would be the umbrella organization they would invoice for the service for the Manitoulin area.

It was noted that the Manitoulin Municipal Association is not capable of performing this umbrella organization.

**Old Business:**

1. Municipal Fire Agreements – Dwayne Elliot from the Manitoulin Mutual Aid System addressed the members regarding the need for Municipal Fire Agreements with the present Mutual Aid System in place. They would like to formally attend the Manitoulin Municipal Association and make a presentation on this topic. It was determined that the members would like a representative from MCSCS to attend for any further assistance for the municipalities

STAFF REPORT TO COUNCIL

Coyote/Wolf Predation Compensation Program

March 20, 2018

BACKGROUND

Councillor Moggy requested that staff investigate a program that would see the Township compensate hunters or trappers for taking nuisance coyotes. Local farmers have expressed concerns over the number of coyotes in the area that are threatening their livestock. Township funded programs such as this are the result of the outcry from farmers that OMAFRA has made the livestock compensation programs more difficult to successfully submit a claim. Councillor Moggy stated the idea would be to sell this program as compensation to the trapper in addition to helping farmers who are experiencing these nuisance coyotes and wolves on their properties.

There are two municipalities on the Island who have programs such as this; Township of Burpee Mills and the Municipality of Gordon/Barrie Island. The program in Gordon/Barrie Island operates under the following guidelines. The municipality offers \$50 per pelt up to a maximum of \$2,000 per year. The predator must be taken within the boundaries of the municipality and must be presented at the municipal office during regular business hours. The hunter or trapper must fill out a form indicating the lot and concession where the animal was taken.

Township staff contacted our municipal solicitor and MNRF to ensure that the Township can legally offer this type of program. While our municipal solicitor indicated that we would need permission from the MNRF to run this type of program; the MNRF provided information that confirms the municipality can offer this type of program.

I have attached a sheet from the Province’s website titled, “Wild animal control: rules for municipalities.” The rules are very simple, the municipality must set the terms and arrangements with the licenced hunter or trapper and provide payment. The hunter or trapper must be licenced, must follow all hunting and trapping rules, and

follow any local by-laws. As per the MNRF 2017-18 Hunting Regulations, Manitoulin is area 43 which indicates that open season for wolf and coyote is all year.

Therefore, the Township may in fact offer a Coyote/Wolf Predation Compensation Program. Staff recommends that this program be adopted by by-law and posted on the municipal website.

#### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

There would be a cost to providing a program such as those described above. Other municipalities on the Island have capped the programs at \$2,000.00 per year and \$50 per pelt.

Hi Jeremy,

Your email was passed to me through Iain McGale with Enforcement. I am happy to provide you with more information on this subject.

The link below provides more information on the rules for municipalities in terms of wild animal control. Licenced hunters and trappers can be used to help deal with these issues during the open seasons. Municipalities do not require special permits or authorization from the ministry to do so. Information on hunting seasons can be found in the Hunting Regulations Summary online at <https://www.ontario.ca/document/ontario-hunting-regulations-summary>.

Licensed hunters and trappers are required to follow all existing hunting and trapping rules (eg. Seasons, limits, not abandon or allow pelts to spoil, etc.) including landowner permission on private land.

In addition, municipalities have the ability to minimize and prevent human-wildlife conflict through the creation of local by-laws to help address the causes of these conflicts (eg. Feeding of wildlife, waste management, etc.).

# Wild animal control: rules for municipalities

The rules for municipalities that want to use licensed hunters or trappers to hunt or trap some species of wild animals in their communities.

Effective July 1, 2013.

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## The law

Municipalities can use licensed hunters or trappers to help deal with furbearing mammals (e.g., coyotes, beavers, skunks, etc.) within their municipal boundaries.

These animal control activities can only be carried out during the open season unless the animal is damaging or about to damage property.

The municipality:

- sets the terms of arrangements with the hunter or trapper
- pays for any services

A municipality does not need a special permit or authorization from the Ministry of Natural Resources to do this.

Hired hunters or trappers must:

- comply with the conditions of their licence
- follow hunting and trapping rules (e.g., use of pelts)
- follow any local by-laws (e.g., when/where firearms can be used)

## Source law

This is a summary of the provincial laws. You can find a complete set of rules related to this activity in:

- Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act, 1997
- Ontario Regulations 665/98 (hunting), 667/98 (trapping)

## Bears

You need special authorization to use a hunter or trapper to deal with bears. But if a bear is posing an immediate threat (e.g., damaging property), no authorization is required.

## Types of furbearing animals

Hunters or trappers can be used to control:

- beaver
- bobcat
- coyote
- fisher
- fox (Arctic, red)
- lynx
- marten
- mink
- muskrat
- opossum
- otter
- raccoon
- red squirrel
- striped skunk
- weasel (least, long-tailed, short-tailed or ermine)
- wolf

## Use a wildlife agent

You can also use a municipal employee to protect property from most species of wild animals on your behalf. The employee must have responsibilities related to animal control.

## Furbearing Mammal Regulations

### Furbearing Mammals

You may only hunt the furbearing mammals (see Definitions, page 86) listed in the table below under the authority of your small game licence. See special regulations for **Wolf and Coyote** on page 83. Note that a small game licence is not valid in northern Ontario and parts of central Ontario (as shown on Map 2, pages 10-11) from June 16 to August 31.

If you wish to hunt **raccoons at night**, you must carry your Outdoors Card with a small game licence tag. You must also be accompanied by a dog licensed for raccoon hunting. You can only use a .22 calibre rim-fire rifle chambered for the following cartridges: .22 short, .22 long or .22 long rifle. Raccoon night hunters must have their guns unloaded and encased while in the vehicle. A licensed night raccoon hunter may use a light if it is not shone from or attached to a vehicle or boat.

### Possession of Pelts During the Closed Season

Small game hunters who harvest furbearing mammals, including wolves and coyotes, during the open season and have not disposed of the pelts by the close of the season must obtain a Licence to Possess a Pelt in order to possess pelts during the closed season. Please contact a ministry office to make arrangements to obtain a Licence to Possess a Pelt (available free of charge).

### Royalty, Import, Export and Shipping

See General Regulations, page 30, for information on import, export and shipping.

A royalty is payable to the province at the time that a person obtains an Export Licence for Furbearing Mammals or Their Pelts.

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## Wolf and Coyote Regulations

Residents and non-residents may only hunt wolves and coyotes under the authority of a valid small game licence.

**(In WMUs 43-45 and 59-95, only a licence is required.)**

In WMUs 1A, 1C, 1D, 2-42, 46-50 and 53-58, a small game licence must be accompanied by a wolf/coyote game seal purchased at licence issuers or participating ServiceOntario centres. You can purchase a maximum of two wolf/coyote game seals per calendar year. The seals may be purchased separately or at the same time.

Coyotes are included in the regulations across core wolf range (WMUs 1A, 1C, 1D, 2-42, 46-50 and 53-58) because coyotes may be difficult to distinguish from wolves, especially Algonquin wolves, where their ranges overlap.

Hunters wishing to use a rifle with a muzzle energy greater than 400 ft-lbs to hunt wolf or coyote during the open season for a big game species (other than bows-only seasons for deer south of the French and Mattawa rivers) must have a valid licence for a big game species that a season is open for. Non-resident hunters should ensure that their big game licence is valid in the area they are hunting wolf/coyote.

Generally, wolves and coyotes cannot be hunted in provincial parks.

### REMINDER – Wolf and Coyote Closed Seasons

It is illegal to hunt or trap wolves or coyotes in the areas within and surrounding Algonquin Provincial Park, Killarney Provincial Park, Queen Elizabeth II Wildlands Provincial Park and Kawartha Highlands Provincial Park to help protect Algonquin wolf (formerly eastern wolf). For more information see page 5 and the table on page 84.

### Party Hunting

Party hunting for wolves and coyotes is not permitted in WMUs 1A, 1C, 1D, 2-42, 46-50 and 53 to 58. This means that you may hunt co-operatively with several hunters; however, each hunter will have to be in possession of a wolf/coyote game seal to hunt wolves/coyotes in these WMUs, and the hunter who harvests the animal must personally seal it. Once a hunter has used his or her wolf/coyote seal, he or she may not continue to participate in the hunt unless in possession of a second wolf/coyote seal. If the hunter has used both his or her wolf/coyote seals, he or she cannot continue to hunt wolf/coyote in these WMUs until the following calendar year. It is illegal to transfer a wolf/coyote game seal from one hunter in order to seal a wolf or coyote taken by another hunter.

**NOTE:** The specific rules around "party hunting" as summarized on page 25 apply only to hunting for moose, deer, elk or black bear.

In WMUs 43-45 and 59-95, where a wolf/coyote seal is not required, you may hunt co-operatively in a group or party for wolves or coyotes without restrictions on the number of animals harvested or who can take them.



### Sealing and Transporting

If you have killed a wolf or coyote under a wolf/coyote game seal, you must, immediately after the kill and at the kill site, securely attach your game seal to the animal in the manner prescribed on the instruction panel attached to the seal. The game seal must remain attached while the pelt (on or off the carcass) is being transported.

You must notch out the month, day and time of the kill on the wolf/coyote game seal, at the time of, and at the location of, the kill.

### Mandatory Reporting

If you purchased a wolf/coyote game seal, you must complete and submit a Wolf/Coyote Hunter Mandatory Questionnaire by January 15 of the year following the hunt. You must submit the completed questionnaire even if you did not hunt. You will receive your mandatory questionnaire from the ministry by mail in December. You may submit your completed questionnaire by mail to the Big Game Harvest Assessment Program, Natural Resources Information Section, Ministry of Natural Resources & Forestry, 300 Water Street, 2nd Floor, North Tower, Peterborough, ON K9J 3C7, or use the easy and quick online option at [ontario.ca/harvestreporting](http://ontario.ca/harvestreporting) to complete the questionnaire.

A CITES export permit is also required to export ALL wolves from Canada. Please contact a ministry office to make arrangements to acquire CITES permits (available free of charge). Please allow up to 10 days to obtain a permit. More information on CITES is available at [www.cites.ca](http://www.cites.ca)

In some countries and provinces, importation of wolves is regulated; requirements for importation should be determined by the exporter prior to shipment.

## Game Amphibians and Reptiles

Bullfrogs may be taken under the authority of a valid sport or conservation fishing licence. No commercial harvest of bullfrogs is permitted.

No firearm other than a bow (compound, recurve, long) or crossbow may be used to take bullfrogs. A person may take bullfrogs at night without a firearm and a person may shine a light for that purpose.

See the Ontario Recreational Fishing Regulations Summary at [ontario.ca/fishing](http://ontario.ca/fishing) for additional information about the capture and use of frogs for bait.

**NOTE: Generally, it is illegal to harvest frogs in provincial parks or Crown Game Preserves.**



### Snapping Turtle as Special Concern Species

The snapping turtle is listed as special concern under Ontario's *Endangered Species Act, 2007*, and the federal *Species at Risk Act, 2002*. Species classified as Special Concern provincially and federally have management planning requirements. The Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry and the federal government will work toward meeting these requirements. **WHEREAS** marijuana will soon be available for purchase through retail outlets in Canada;

**WHEREAS** the sale of marijuana will generate new tax revenues;

**WHEREAS** the Government of Canada and the Government of Ontario have been actively discussing how to distribute the new tax revenues generated by the sale of marijuana;

**WHEREAS** the Government of Canada and the Government of Ontario have thus far not agreed to distribute any of the new tax revenues generated by the sale of marijuana to municipalities directly;

**WHEREAS** municipalities are responsible for critical infrastructure projects, such as roads, bridges, water treatment and delivery of potable water;

**WHEREAS** municipalities face a significant challenge in funding critical infrastructure projects and have limited options for increasing revenues, aside from raising property taxes, which negatively impacts all taxpayers; and

**WHEREAS** the new tax revenues generated from the sale of marijuana, could be used to help offset infrastructure costs for municipalities.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the Government of Canada and the Government of Ontario be urged to allocate a proportionate share of the new tax revenues generated from the sale of marijuana, to municipalities directly;

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Government of Canada and the Government of Ontario be urged to create a fund, similar to the Gas Tax Fund and the Clean Water and Wastewater Fund, from the new tax revenues generated by the sale of marijuana, to provide funding to municipalities for infrastructure projects;

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that a copy of this motion be sent to the Right Honourable Justin Trudeau, Prime Minister of Canada, Mr. Andrew Scheer, Leader of the Conservative Party of Canada, Mr. Jagmeet Singh, Leader of the New Democratic Party of Canada, Ms. Elizabeth May, Leader of the Green Party of Canada, all Members of Parliament, the Honourable Kathleen Wynne, Premier of Ontario, Mr. Patrick Brown, Leader of the Progressive Conservative Party of Ontario, Ms. Andrea Horwath, Leader of the New Democratic Party of Ontario, and all Members of Provincial Parliament in Ontario; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT** a copy of this Motion be sent to the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM), and the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) for their consideration.

At its regular council meeting of January 15, 2018, Essex Town Council discussed the ongoing issue of school closures throughout Ontario. These school closures in many cases result in properties that are left as vacant and unused for substantial periods of time and this often results in properties that not only become eyesores for the affected communities but as well often have further negative impacts on the social and economic development of that community and its municipality.

Many municipalities might be interested in purchasing these properties for development and sustainment as a hub in their community. However the feasibility of this certainly becomes more daunting and for some municipalities even impossible when municipalities that are interested in purchasing must first (pursuant to current regulations) purchase these properties at fair market value with taxpayer dollars and then may need to spend further taxpayer monies in order to retrofit and/or remediate the building (s) on these properties.

Given the fact that these properties were already originally purchased and developed into schools using taxpayer dollars we ask that consideration be given to the fact that the taxpayers should not again have to purchase these properties at fair market value if the intent



is for the particular Municipality to develop and/or sustain these properties for the betterment of its community.

**(R18-01-013)** That the Town of Essex send a request to the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), ROMA and all other municipalities in Ontario requesting that when schools boards make decisions to close schools, that they have to offer the building to the local municipality for a dollar.

Council believes that providing the opportunity to purchase the buildings for a dollar would give municipalities a meaningful opportunity to ensure that these properties remain a key hub for social and economic development in their respective communities.

# SALMON *Classic*

Dear Alton:

Once again, we would like to thank you for your support of the Manitoulin Expositor Salmon Classic last year. Your support in 2017 was to provide a weigh-in station in Manitowaning. We hope that you will consider a sponsorship for this year's event.

We're in the planning stages just now for the 3rd annual edition of the Manitoulin Expositor Salmon Classic. This year's dates are **Saturday, July 28 through to Sunday noon, August 26,**

Last year, the second event, we learned a few things

- First, the switch to a four-week format was immensely popular and had a very positive impact on fishing tourism.
- Second, putting up a \$100 daily prize for the heaviest fish weighed in across the entire weigh-in system was a good idea.

The other main change was the new youth (14 and under) ticket price. Not a lot of young people purchased this the first year (just over 50) as a percentage of all the anglers participating, but it was a good start for these young people, most of whom wouldn't have otherwise participated.

Those were the major changes last year and they were very well received.

For this year's, the 2018 edition, our main change is to go to a **\$200 daily cash prize** for the largest fish (salmon or trout) weighed in each day of the tournament. The cash prizes remain the same (\$30,000) but we are doubling the daily prize by eliminating the \$1000 weekly prize (except for week one) and redistributing the funds across the tournament. (The way it had been working out, each week someone would win a daily prize, which would guarantee them the weekly prize that week and the grand-prize winner was, of course, going to also have been a daily and weekly winner too.) We've already had tremendously positive feedback on these changes.

## **Last year, 672 anglers participated in the Manitoulin Expositor Salmon Classic 2017.**

Our main objective is to improve tourism and introduce new people to Manitoulin. Our post-event survey reveals that 60-plus percent of the fishers came to Manitoulin specifically for this event. They came from Sudbury, North Bay, Ajax, Earleton, North Bay, Massey, London and area, French River, Saskatchewan, Toronto, Hamilton and small southern and Northern Ontario towns too numerous to mention.

The survey shows that 47 percent of all the anglers fished for a week or more, a good indication that people came here, stayed for a while and spent money in the process. An incredible **95 percent** of the survey's respondents said they would highly recommend the event to their friends.

***This is the "word of mouth" vitally important in developing a new tourism product and expanding the Manitoulin Island tourism plan.***

Whereas municipal governments in Ontario do not have the right to approve landfill projects in their communities, but have authority for making decisions on all other types of development;

And whereas this outdated policy allows private landfill operators to consult with local residents and municipal Councils, but essentially ignores them;

And whereas proposed Ontario legislation (Bill 139) will grant municipalities additional authority and autonomy to make decisions for their communities;

And whereas municipalities already have exclusive rights for approving casinos and nuclear waste facilities within their communities and further that the province has recognized the value of municipal approval for power generation facilities;

And whereas the recent report from Ontario's Environmental Commissioner has found that Ontario has a garbage problem, particularly from Industrial, Commercial and Institutional (ICI) waste generated within the City of Toronto, where diversion rates are as low as 15% and unless significant efforts are made to increase recycling and diversion rates, a new home for this Toronto garbage will need to be found, as landfill space is filling up quickly;

And whereas municipalities across Ontario are quietly being identified and targeted as potential landfill sites for future Toronto garbage by private landfill operators;

And whereas other communities should not be forced to take Toronto waste, as landfills can contaminate local watersheds, air quality, dramatically increase heavy truck traffic on community roads and reduce the quality of life for local residents;


And whereas municipalities should be considered experts in waste management as they are responsible for this within their own communities and often have decades worth of in-house expertise in managing waste, recycling and diversion programs;

And whereas municipalities should have the exclusive right to approve or reject these projects and assess whether the potential economic benefits are of sufficient value to offset any negative impacts and environmental concerns;

Now therefore be it resolved that the Township of South Stormont calls upon the Government of Ontario and all political parties, to formally grant municipalities the authority to approve landfill projects in or adjacent to their communities prior to June, 2018; and that in the case of a two-tier municipality, the approval be required at both the upper tier and affected lower tier municipalities;



