Assiginack Museum Committee Meeting - August 14th, 2018 - 7:00pm

PRESENT: Hugh Moggy, Alice Pennie, John Pennie, Kelsey Maguire.

DISCUSSION:

#1. Recap of July 10th Meeting: The 2018 application for the Community Museum Operating Grant had been submitted. The sprinkler system was repaired. Jean McLennan's 100th Birthday party was on July 21; The museum and township sent flowers. The Assiginack Historical Society plans to purchase a park bench for the museum and dedicate it to Jean with a plaque.

- **#2. Summer Student:** The Museum summer student Ella Stewart has been working out well. On top of usual duties, she has also done some painting, obituary indexing, cataloguing, and some family histories research. She has also been conducting the Children's Recreation activities at the museum, which have gone well. There are still two more Recreation days this year on August 21 & 23.
- #3. Community Market: Debajehmujig had held the Community Markets in July this year at the Queen's Park, but weren't planning on continuing in August, so the vendors have returned to the museum lawn for the remaining five Fridays in August. So far we've averaged 3 to 5 vendor tables. This Friday, the ACW & UCW will be holding a bake sale fundraiser for Ruta Tribinevicius.
- #4. Bus Trips: The bus trips scheduled for September 10th, 20th, and 21st have been cancelled. The remaining trips for September 25, October 1, 2, 3 are still on. Kelsey would still like to attend a wedding on the 21st, so if possible could we arrange a volunteer for that afternoon.
- #5: Displays: Delmer has brought down the parts for the "photo door", but the ground beside the Pioneer Home still needs to be levelled before it can be secured. Kelsey will pick up a piece of 8 x 4 plywood to secure to map display to; Kelsey has added roads for Assiginack, could he do Bidwell's also? Kelsey has the list of names and years for the Reeve display, we just need the frames and photos. There aren't official 8x10 photos of just the Reeves at the town office, only of the whole council as a group, so we'll need to track down some photos. The Expositor may have them on file?
- **#6. Standards:** The Museum Standards need to be brought up to date for 2018 so they can be approved at the October meeting. Kelsey will go over them to see want needs to be updated or changed. A subcommittee should be made to go over them.

- Isobel Harry from the Expositor came earlier today to interview and gather information for an Article on the Museum for next week's newspaper.
- Kelsey has a photo slide scanner. He could bring it in to the museum for September and offer to digitize slides for people if they bring them in. Will post to Facebook.

It's the day after the distribution of prizes marking the finalé of this year's Salmon Classic event.

With three years of experience now and with an annual growth in numbers of anglers participating, we think the event is growing into its name and is truly becoming a "Classic".

We gave away \$30,000 in cash as usual this year, but the rest of the prizes were excellent and a special thanks to everyone who contributed gear and other prizes so all of the top 25 on the leader board could bring something home.

Thank you very much to all the individuals and organizations that contributed funds. These funds are earmarked for off-Island marketing efforts that have clearly been successful.

The event was created to reinvigorate interest in fishing for deep-water species around Manitoulin and bring back the whole category of downrigger anglers and the millions of dollars they contribute to the local economy during the month-long event.

This year, there were well over 700 tickets sold: at least 720 (we don't have the exact number yet as we haven't picked up the ticket stubs yet from some of the further-away sellers.)

Sunday's windup and awarding of prizes at South Baymouth told the tale: there were several Manitoulin people in the top 25 and many of them did very well but the vast majority of names called were anglers who had travelled to Manitoulin to participate in the Salmon Classic: these are our tourists and the ones present on Sunday are a representative proportion of all the 700-plus participants, most of whom fished multiple days and weeks.

This is by way of an enormous thank you to everyone who sold tickets, provided a weigh-in station, donated prizes, donated funds to help with off-Island marketing, talked the event up and in any way helped to make this event a "Salmon Classic".



A/OFRC Electrofishing Assessment at Smith Bay Creek Wiikwemkoong!

In June, A/OFRC came to Wiikwemkoong and conducted an electrofishing assessment on Smith Bay Creek to identify baseline fisheries information on the creek to go along with the Smith Bay Creek Enhancement Strategy that Manitoulin Streams had developed to help with planning stream restoration activities. The results were exciting! A total of 554 fish were captured comprising of 11 different species. The most abundant species included Rainbow Trout (340), Northern Redbelly Dace (89) and the least abundant were longnose dace (1), Brassy Minnow (1), Fathead Minnow (1), Blacknose Shiner (1) and Finescale Dave (1).





Kagawong Restoration Begins


Country Fest Weekend




Truxor to the Rescue on Blue Jay Creek & Michael's Bay
