Historical Society has purchased new display cabinets for the museum. Kelsey has placed war memorabilia in one of these cabinets. Denure Bus Tours – They have contacted Kelsey with regard to four trips, September 27, September 29, September 30, and October 1, 2021. Discussion was held regarding bag lunch that they could possibly eat at the Pavilion. Kelsey is awaiting confirmation from the Company.

It was decided to leave the quilt and clothing display until spring now since museum will soon close for the season. Alice spoke to Mel Carr regarding the older clothing belonging to her grandmother, Jean McLennan, Mel indicated she has them and will see that the museum gets them.

150 Discussion

Kelsey has video tapes of 125 celebration, will look over them through the winter.

Discussed printing additional calendars, Kelsey will contact Beacon Images and Alice will speak to Heather regarding the printing company she uses.

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Attendance

COMPARISON: Comparing this year's visitor numbers to 2019's pre-Covid statistics is difficult, but since the museum was not open to visitors in 2020 it is the most recent comparison data. This year we didn't have any bus tours, school trips, or summer recreation programming. The museum opened much later in the season than usual. It was only open from July 21st until October 1st, compared to usually being open on June 1st. Normally, the museum would be open 7 days a week in July and August, but due to not having a summer student this year that was reduced to being open only 5 days a week.

COVID-19

This year, the Museum's activities have been heavily influenced by the ongoing COVID-19 situation. The museum did not open on June 1st as it usually would, as the province was still under Step 1 of the Ontario Covid closures. When Ontario's reopening plan began Step 2 on June 30th, museums were still not included in the types of businesses allowed to be opened at that time.

Late-June and Early-July was spent setting the museum up for an eventually opening and installing the cases and materials for the new displays.

The museum was able to open to the public when Step 3 of the Ontario reopening plan began. The museum opening for the season on July 21st.

The museum was able to reopen with several Covid restrictions and protocols in place; including mandatory mask requirements, capacity limits, social distancing, passive screening, collecting contact tracing information, providing hand sanitizer, and posting informative signage. The developed safety plan was kept up to date with the Provincial requirements during all stages of reopening and the museum regularly checked with Public Health Sudbury and Districts for clarifications. The museum was not required to check vaccination receipts after September 21st as it did not fall under the type of businesses affected by that.

Facebook

The museum continued to provide information and photographs on its FaceBook page in 2021, updating the most during the summer months. Regularly posting pictures and historical tidbits to the museum Facebook group has been an ongoing program for engagement and advertising.

Posts were pre-scheduled so that during June 12th to September 30th there were typically at least six posts a week. For the “off-season”, posts have been pre-scheduled to five days a week for October, and will be three days a week November through December 2021.

A group from Debajehmujig came to tour the museum and learn local information on July 22nd in preparation for walking tours that they held in July and September.

Assiginack 150

2021 marked the 150th anniversary of the Incorporation of the Township of Assiginack.

150 events, both at the museum and around the rest of the township, were largely restricted by Covid regulations this year. The Assiginack 150 Planning Committee, separate from the museum's plans, hopes that more events will be possible as a "deferred" 150 celebration in 2022.

This year, the museum focused more on projects to commemorate 150, rather than activities. The museum produced a 2021 calendar of historical photos, began distribution of Oral History interview kits, made FaceBook history posts, and began display planning & development.

As for the museum's plans for the differed 150 in 2022, options are still being considered towards whatever the Covid-19 situation might end up being and what restrictions might be in place. Open Houses and participatory activities may or may not be possible and will be done as is deemed safe. Special displays and showcases at the museum are planned to include a quilt display/show and clothing display/fashion showcase in some capacity, depending on what can be done safely.

Exhibits

NEW DISPLAYS

War Display: The “War Room” display from upstairs has been relocated to the Smith Room Gallery. The Historical Society purchased four display cases for the museum in order to showcase these artifacts. The artifacts from upstairs, as well as some others that had been in storage, have been reorganized into the new cases with newly printed tags and plaques.

Moving the displays for veterans and the World Wars to the gallery improves the accessibility for visitors and provides a more stable environment for long term preservation compared to the upstairs of the 1883 section of the building.

Horse Racing: A display of items related to horse racing and the Manitowaning Racetrack has been setup in the entrance room.

Art: Five new art pieces have been added to the gallery space, including prints by Daphne Odjig (2) & Carl Beam (1), and paintings by Brian Waboose (2).

Dining Room: A new set of silverware was purchased by the Historical Society for the dining room. The dining room was missing a good set of cutlery that was appropriate for the rest of the table setting.

Upstairs: Displays for Graniteware, Tobacco, and Kitchen Machinery have been setup in the display cases upstairs that formerly held the War Room artifacts.

UPDATED DISPLAYS

Smith Room: Many of the paper tags and info panels that were on the walls in the Smith Room Gallery have been replaced with printed plastic tags and plaques. This has greatly improved the presentation and readability of several of the displays. The new tags were provided by David Smith and the Historical Society. Several of the display cases bottoms were also relined with corrugated plastic.

Paul Kane: The Paul Kane portraits display was updated with new tags and a new information plaque with a map. A new small display case was purchased by the Historical Society to go underneath the portraits, and now displays a selection of items related to early travel writers that visited Manitowaning.

Physical Plant

MAINTENANCE

Flowers: Planting and care for the flower beds was taken care of by the Assiginack Horticulture Association. The Horticultural Association has been tending the flowers on the Museum grounds for 66 years now, and we thank them for their continued care and generosity.

Lighting: The Historical Society purchased LED light bulbs to replace the halogen light bulbs used throughout the museum. This should cut down on electricity usage, heat produced, and UV damage over the long term.

Carpets: Carpeting was installed in the Fireplace Room and the hallway of the 1883 section of the building. The floorboards there have always been very uneven and a rug has been used to even it out, but that old rug was in poor shape so the Historical Society offered to have commercial-grade carpet installed to replace it.

Security System: The power supply to one of the security system terminals needed to be replaced in March. The batteries for both terminals were also replaced and should last for another ~5 years.

REPAIRS

Bathrooms: The metal doors to the outside bathrooms were painted. The privacy slide locks also had longer bolts and wingnuts attached to the outside of the door so that they could be opened more easily in an emergency.

The post frame for the hanging sign on the corner was painted. The outside of the bell tower had paint redone in several spots.

Tree brush was trimmed around the bell tower.

The dead hedges on the South side of the museum and by the old front door were removed and grass seed was planted.

The garden hoses used on the North side was replaced. The Horticulture Society has also gotten a winding hose-reel box to store the garden hose in.

Three new dehumidifiers were purchased by the Historical Society.

New paper towel dispensers were installed as the paper for the old ones can't be stocked anymore.

RECOMMENDED REPAIRS

There are several places where the mortar on the schoolhouse has deteriorated and new mortar should be applied to fill the gaps. The log on the south side to the left of the door is beginning to shift and needs to be reset. The log along the base of the west side is also quite deteriorated and will need repair.

The school, pioneer home, and lawnmower shed are all shingled with cedar shake shingles. These were last redone a number of years ago and are reaching the point where they need to be replaced again. There has been no noticeable leaking for the school roof, but the shingles are curling in a few places. The pioneer home's are quite bad on the south side, which seems to get the worst from the sun and weather as well as because of the apple tree. The pioneer home north side however seems to not have any problems that I've noticed. The lawnmower shed's roof is in the worst shape of the three and definitely leaks in a few places, so spray foam has been used in the short term to fill those gaps.

The posts on the bell tower are also due to be checked and repaired as necessary. The frame still appears quite stable, but should be checked professionally and attended to preemptively.

Roof: The roof of the original building in the center and 1883 portion in the front still need to be re-shingled and have the chimneys repaired.

A fan belt in the air circulation system needs to be replaced. The Historical Society has left money with the Township to hire someone to do this.

The remote switch for the gallery lights at the top of the ramp needs to be replaced.

The eaves on the East side of the building need to be cleaned. They are much too high up for any of the museum's ladders. The Historical Society has left money with the Township to hire someone to clean these eaves, as well as to repaint the roof fascia.



Grants

CMOG

The Community Museum Operating Grant was applied for as usual.

MAP

The museum has applied for the Museum Assistance Program's COVID-19 Reopening Fund grant. Our museum should meet the guidelines to receive the \$5000 tier of grant funding.

Summer Student

The Museum did not have a Summer Student this year. During the application period in February it was still unknown if the museum would be able to open this year, and when we did eventually open it wasn't until mid-July.

Volunteers

The volunteers from the Horticulture Association took care of the flower beds at the Museum all Summer.

The Museum Committee is made up of volunteers that have graciously donated their time and effort towards ensuring the successful operation of the Museum.

David Smith has done extensive work at the Museum this year on behalf of the Assiginack Historical Society; purchasing display materials, organizing materials, and planning displays. The Museum is extremely grateful for all that he has done to help preserve and promote Assiginack's history.

Research

Cenotaphs: Bill Mullen has continued to reference information from the museum as part of his ongoing research on Manitoulin veteran memorials. He also donated an updated copy of his research information so far.

The Manitoulin Expositor referenced the Expositor archives for historical news clippings.

Debajehmujig Creation Center visited to gather information for their Manitowaning Walking Tours.

A new book scanner and a slide scanner were purchased by the Historical Society for the museum. The book scanner provides a much easier and safer method for copying pages from the Expositor archives.

Any newly scanned obituary clippings from old Manitoulin Expositors the were done for genealogy requests or for the museum files were also forwarded to the Manitoulin Roots website for transcription there.

GENEALOGY

Over the course of the season, 31 Genealogy research requests and 10 information requests came in to the Museum, either over the phone, via email, or via FaceBook messages.

Advertising

BROCHURES

Museum brochures and Manitowaning Walking Tour Maps continued to be distributed to other museums, information booths, and ferry terminals.

FACEBOOK

The Museum's Facebook group page (facebook.com/assignackmuseum) has been regularly updated by Alice Pennie and Kelsey Maguire, who have been handling the posts and content for the page, advertising the museum and showcasing information available from us.

Analysis & Recommendations

ADVERTISING

One area of advertising that the Museum is currently lacking in is a focus on bringing more local residents into the Museum. Budgeting for ongoing local advertising, either in the newspaper or some other initiative, might help to keep more local residents informed about the Museum and encourage them to visit and use the facilities, not just for events but for the ongoing general services the museum can provide.

More signage along the highway would also be a benefit in drawing more traffic to the museum. A billboard would be ideal, and a provincial Tourism Oriented Directional Signage (TODS) sign on Hwy 6 for the museum would be very useful.

2022

COVID-19 will likely still be a concern in 2022, and everything planned has to keep in mind how suddenly things may have to be changed to accommodate the situation, whatever it may be. Finding methods to continue to serve the Museum's purposes in the community and still be safe will be a challenge, and goals and expectations will have to be kept flexible.

The Committee can have any number of volunteers to work with, as long as Council has approved their participation for legal liability purposes.

Appointment

For the purposes of these Terms of Reference, "Ex-officio members" mean persons who are members of this Committee by virtue of another office. Without limiting the

generality of the foregoing, for example the Mayor or Council are deemed ex-officio members.

All members of the Committee, save and except for ex-officio members, will be officially appointed by Council.

Additional volunteer members of the Committee will be recommended by the Committee and officially appointed by Council.

The advertising of volunteer vacancies on and appointments to this Committee will be in accordance with the policies adopted by Council from time to time.

(Generally Tuesday nights)

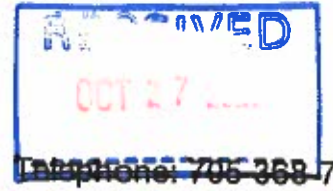

Re: CLI-ECA Application Process

Dear Clients,

As many of you may already be aware, the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) recently approved and started the implementation of a new and streamlined Environmental Compliance Approval (ECA) application process dedicated to Municipal Sewage Collection Systems and Municipal Stormwater Management Systems within the province.

A Consolidated Linear Infrastructure ECA (CLI-ECA) is a single approval that is intended to replace the numerous pipe-by-pipe sewage works ECAs that have been issued for these systems in the past. The new process may include operational flexibility conditions that pre-authorize future specified alterations in accordance with the conditions in the ECA. As a result, a separate sewage works approval would not be needed and municipalities would be able to undertake construction if specific conditions in the CLI-ECA are met. There are two applications that require submission: one for collection systems and one for stormwater.

As well, a CLI-ECA would not expire. The process includes a requirement that the ECA Holder must submit an application for review of the ECA at regular intervals (e.g., on a cycle of up to five years) to ensure that the description of the system is refreshed at regular intervals and that any terms and conditions associated with operational flexibility remain up to date.

Application Deadlines

You may have already received communications about this new application process from the MECP regarding the deadlines and expectations for each of these applications. Applications are expected to be submitted electronically by the Owner. For those you who haven't yet received, please note that the application due dates are defined by MECP based on systems type and owner. **We are advised that application deadlines for both the Municipal Sewage Collection and the Municipal Stormwater Management Systems are as follows:**

- **Jan 21, 2022 (ToR, communities with combined sewers)**
- **Feb 18, 2022 (larger communities)**
- **March 18, 2022 (smaller communities, most northern and eastern Ontario)**

The MECP will be holding information webinars throughout the fall to discuss CLI, and how they plan to implement the approach. They will also be engaging with municipalities closer to their potential application submission date, to provide information on how to prepare these ECA applications.

Please note that the MECP may be providing some flexibility in the application date. If you feel you may be in a position to need an extension, or have questions for the MECP, please contact enviropemissions@ontario.ca.

Your local OCWA team is also always available to you should you have questions about the new application process.

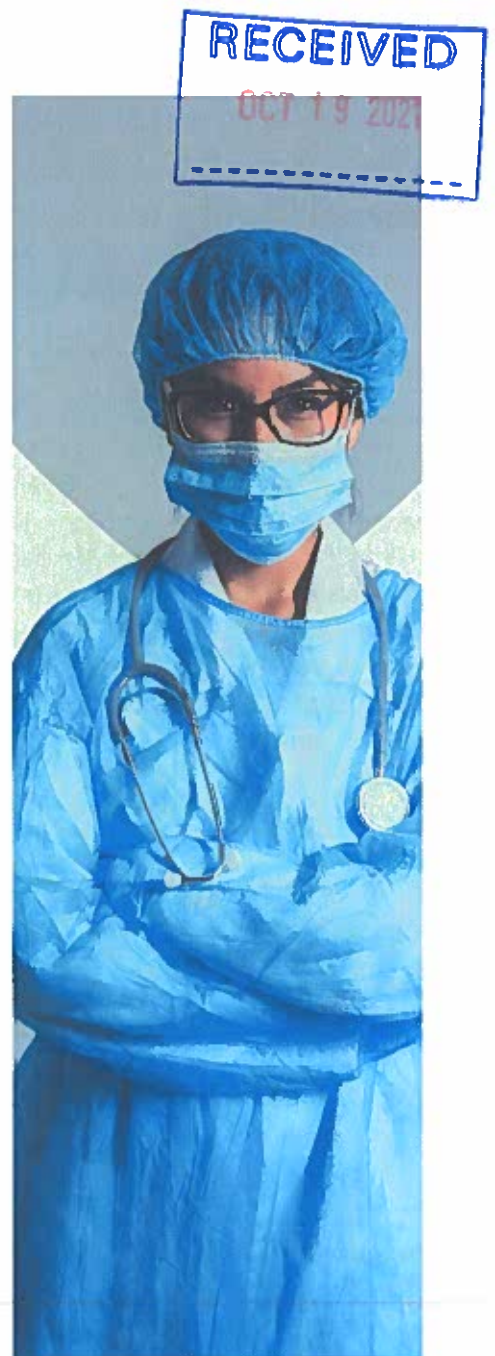
The Auxiliary would like to thank the Hospital staff who have committed so much and made sure all are safe and well cared for. Thank you!

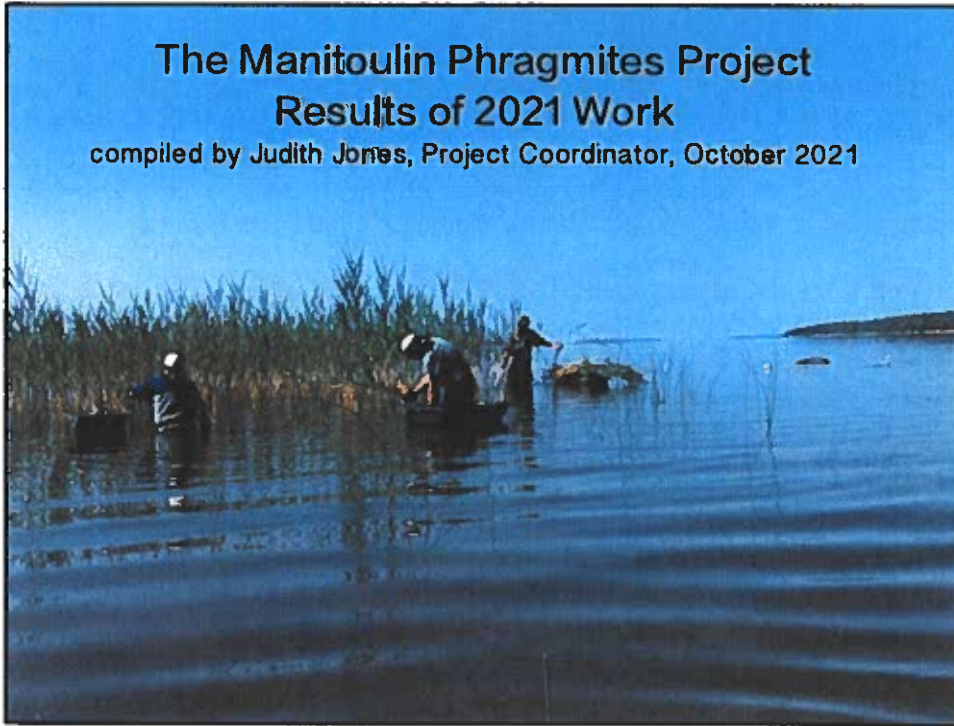

The Manitoulin Phragmites Project

Results of 2021 Work

compiled by Judith Jones, Project Coordinator, October 2021

Phragmites (say “frag-MITE-eeze”) is a very tall, invasive grass that has been spreading aggressively on shorelines and in wetlands in our area. Phragmites can quickly grow into dense patches that eventually wipe out all other vegetation. It is a serious threat to property values, recreation, tourism, wildlife and fish habitat, and aesthetics. Southern Ontario has lost hectares and hectares of natural habitat to this highly invasive species. **The Manitoulin Phragmites Project** was started to make sure that does not happen in the Manitoulin region!

Our Goal: To reduce Phragmites across our landscape to a low level that can be maintained by ordinary people with a little bit of annual effort. We have just finished our six year of work.

What’s up with Phragmites on Manitoulin? This letter tells all about our work in 2021. A listing of all Manitoulin Phragmites sites and their control status begins on page 5.

Heading towards our goal! Phragmites is under control or eradicated at 95 sites (49 sites with species at risk (SAR) and 46 sites without SAR). In 2021 control and/or maintenance was done at 45 sites, including work (without us!) by partners and volunteers. We assessed new work areas for 2022 north of White’s Point (NEMI), around Ned’s Island (Burpee-Mills), in Hideaway Cove (Billings), east side of Julia Bay, and the south shore of Barrie Island (Gordon-Barrie Island).

Major accomplishments: The northern shore of **South Bay** (formerly 23 ha of Phragmites) is finally under control! This work has been in partnership with Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory and the Invasive Phragmites Control Centre. The entire shoreline of **Michael’s Bay** (formerly 19 ha of Phragmites) is under control! as are Leask Bay, Hilly Grove (both Assiginack), and both sides of the Barrie Island causeway. See photos on our Facebook page.

We still need more Phrag Watchers! So far, 59 control sites have been turned over to volunteers or partners. If any Phrag comes back, the Phrag Watchers know what to do and will get on it right away. Can you help by taking care of a site? See list on page 5. Get in touch if you can help.

More from 2021: The water level in Lake Huron has gone down a bit, which means more dry land exposed and people driving vehicles on the shoreline. This is the number one way Phragmites is spread in our region. With funding from the Gosling Foundation we advertised extensively about the issue, running radio PSAs on every long weekend and newspaper ads every week. There were two main messages: "Learn to recognize Phragmites and don't drive through it." and "If pulling weeds off a boat propeller, throw them into the boat and dispose of them on dry land."

We made no progress at Lake Wolsey in 2021. We surveyed Phrag in May but then had boat trouble all summer and were unable to make any further trips. We attempted to canoe down the creek and portage over the beaver dam but it didn't bring us to the area we needed to work. Add in windy, rainy weather. On the day the Truxor cutting machines arrived, our access road was under water, and I didn't find the key to the driveway gate. After these frustrations, we have now made contact with two more landowners who have offered to help us with access next year.

Boat motor problems really hampered our style. We had to row ourselves back after getting stranded in the middle of Rozell's Bay. Then the motor conked out again and left us floating in South Bay. An eagle flew by and we jokingly suggested it go for help, and sure enough it flew off and came back again with a very friendly neighbour who offered a tow and helped us survey!

NEW! We have just received funding from the Invasive Phragmites Control Fund which will allow us to buy a new motor and to upgrade our beater boat so we won't get stranded and won't risk tearing our waders on rusty screws. We're still looking for a 14' aluminum utility boat in better condition (no leaks). I am looking forward to going everywhere next summer that we didn't get to in 2021.

We met a lot of new people in 2021 and also got back to working with many of our most steadfast volunteers (we really missed them during the first part of Covid in 2020). We met four new landowners, two new people who ferried us around in boats for surveys, and installed seven new Phrag watchers to take over finished sites. A total of 43 wonderful volunteers contributed over 250 hours of hard work to making Manitoulin Phrag-free. THANK YOU SO MUCH!!

What's ahead? Next year, 2022, will be the last year of our three-year government funding. After that, the future project is uncertain, so in 2022 we want to get as many sites as possible into the care of landowners and volunteers. We'll be contacting people to set up times to look at sites.

This fall we surveyed most of Manitoulin's North Channel shorelines and—no surprise—found more Phrag. We will be starting work in some of these areas in 2022. If you have property on the North Channel and have Phragmites on the shoreline, please get in touch.

The Gosling Foundation has extended our use of their funding into next year so we can produce a full size poster with a beautiful photo showing the value of our natural landscape. The message is about how to play responsibly: avoid driving through Phrag, leaving ruts, etc. Watch for this to be hanging up around the Island by mid-summer.

Our 7-minute How-To-Control-Phrag YouTube video has been very successful. We've received feedback from as far away as Vermont. The video doesn't give much background on Phrag and why it's a threat because I had assumed that information was widely available. However, there is a need for it, so this winter one of our detailed Zoom/Powerpoint presentations will be posted on YouTube to fill that gap.

Help make Manitoulin Island Phrag-free!

- ◆ **DON'T DRIVE THROUGH PHRAGMITES!** Learn to recognize it. If you do drive through it, clean your ATV or vehicle in the yard before going out again.
- ◆ **WHEN PULLING WEEDS OFF THE BOAT PROP**, throw them in the boat for disposal on dry land.
- ◆ **READ OUR SIMPLE INFO PAMPHLET** available on our Facebook page (@manitoulinphrag) to find out about methods of control or **WATCH** our YouTube video (search Manitoulin Phrag).
- ◆ **KEEP AN EYE OUT FOR PHRAGMITES AT HOME.** Contact us if you have some. We'll help you figure out what to do and get you started.
- ◆ **REPORT PHRAGMITES LOCATIONS TO US.** Tell us if you find it so we can take action.
- ◆ **JOIN US for Manitoulin Phragmites Week, July 16-22, 2022.** Ask us to host a work bee in your area or to make a house call to your property.
- ◆ **HIRE SUMMER STUDENTS** and make Phragmites control part of their job. We'll be happy to show them what to do.

Special COVID-19 Statement from Medical Officer of Health, Public Health Sudbury & Districts, Dr. Penny Sutcliffe

Issued: Thursday, October 28, 2021

Over the last several weeks, there has been an alarming increase in the number of people testing positive for COVID-19 in Greater Sudbury.

While the province of Ontario is seeing improvements in COVID-19 case counts, trends in Greater Sudbury are going in the opposite direction. We are currently a COVID-19 hotspot, with a case rate that is among the highest in the province. **These trends signal a call to immediate action.** Now is the time for each of us to assess our individual actions and decisions and ramp up COVID-19 precautions—layer on the protective measures such as vaccination, masking, distancing, working from home, and importantly, staying home when even mildly unwell. We have the power in our hands to turn this around.

Make no mistake: COVID-19 surges can happen anywhere and can happen quickly. Locally, no single setting or sector is driving the current increase. The number of cases without any known source of exposure has increased over the last few months, which indicates a worrying trend of community spread of the virus. There are also seven active outbreaks in the Public Health Sudbury & Districts service area, all within Greater Sudbury. These include outbreaks in the Sudbury Jail (59 cases to date), Memorial Park (21 cases), and two schools (6 cases). Our case count per 100 000 residents is among the highest in the province and the percentage of local

COVID tests coming back positive is greater than it has been in weeks. The 7-day rate of new cases was 82.5 per 100 000 population, compared with 17 for the province of Ontario. Increases in active cases lead to subsequent increases in hospitalizations, and Health Sciences North already has the highest occupancy percentage among all Ontario hospitals that have more than 100 acute beds.

As a community, we have not done anything wrong, but the recent numbers mean that we must do more things right.

We can continue to enjoy the benefits of the provincial *Plan to Safely Reopen Ontario and Manage COVID-19 for the Long-Term*, but only if we strengthen our individual commitment to prevention. Remember that the virus is not selective about who it infects. Any of us could catch COVID-19 and spread it to others—including to those who are more vulnerable, could be inconvenienced by self-isolation, or could develop “long COVID”. As you make decisions about your day-to-day activities, including plans for outings and gatherings, think about the steps you can take to reduce the risk of COVID-19. You know the steps: masking, hosting gatherings outdoors, physical distancing, self-screening for symptoms and getting tested as soon as you can if you do have symptoms, following self-isolation guidance, and vaccination. **It is just not worth it—for you and those around you—to skip these simple yet effective steps.**

In addition to leading the vaccination program, Public Health is also responsible for following up on every case and contact of COVID-19. Our public health follow-up and direction puts a protective shield around cases and contacts—protecting families and workplaces and schools by preventing further spread of the virus. However, we can only do this work effectively with the patience, kindness, and full cooperation of everyone we need to contact. In light of the growing challenges we are experiencing with this important work, I am issuing a Class Order under the *Health Protection and Promotion Act*, requiring all individuals in Public Health Sudbury & Districts’ service area who are either a case, potential case or contact of a case to follow Public Health direction. The Order is enforceable by law and is posted on our website.

This pandemic has tested our resilience, and we’re all looking forward to a day when this chapter in our lives becomes history. Until that time, however, it’s important to remember that we are all in this together and that our collective efforts and our commitment to public health measures are what will see us through.
