

MANITOWANING FALL FAIR GENERAL RULES

Everyone pays admission at the gate when attending the fair and that includes people on floats in the parade, all riders on horses, exhibitors and vendors.

Visit our facebook page - Manitowaning Fall Fair for updates, information, contacts, and fair schedule.

The privilege of membership is open to all residents of Ontario.

Memberships can be obtained as follows: Adult \$6.00, Juniors (18 and under) \$4.00 from any Director . This fee is for the **fair in 2024. For 2023**, fee is \$5.00 for adults, \$3.00 for juniors

Each Exhibitor must have his/her own individual membership. You may not share a membership with your Spouse or other person. If a Junior member wants to enter any of the Adult Categories, he/she must have an Adult Membership.

From the sum or sums awarded to each exhibitor as a prize or prizes, the Treasurer shall retain the sum of \$6.00 or \$4.00 for the next year's membership.

If for any reason the receipts of the fair are insufficient to cover all expenses and prize money, then all the expenses will be paid first, and prize money will be reduced and paid equally to each entitled exhibitor on a percentage basis.

No prize will be awarded if the article or animal is not considered worthy of a prize by the judge.

All prizes are to be accepted as donated or awarded and not exchanged.

All protests must be made to the Secretary, in writing before the exhibit leaves the fairgrounds, before 3:00 pm Saturday. Protest must be accompanied by a sum of \$5.00, which will become the property of the Society if the protest is not substantiated.

All exhibits in the arena must be properly ticketed before submitting them for judging.

The exhibits can be brought to the arena on Thursday evening between 7:00 pm and 9:00 pm and/or Friday morning starting at 8:30 am and the doors are locked at 11:30 am. All animals and fowl must be in their pens on the grounds Saturday before 11:30 am, with completed entry forms.

The judges will commence to award the prize for the articles in the building at 12:30 p.m. Friday and 12:00 p.m. Saturday, for livestock and poultry unless otherwise stated.

Only **one** entry is allowed for each individual section in each class except in the Livestock and Poultry Classes.

During the inspection for any of the exhibits, **No person will be allowed to interfere with the judge**, nor will they be allowed to go near them except for the Directors and helpers for the category being judged.

Any person wishing to change a ticket due to a mistake must only do so with attendance of any Official before judging begins.

All exhibitors and their helpers **must** have the exhibit number visible when removing their exhibits.

Exhibits cannot be removed until Saturday at 3:00pm

The Fair closes at 4:00 pm

If a mistake is found on the statement within seven days of receipt of the cheque, return all papers and cheques to the secretary so that the corrections can be made.

All cheques must be cashed within six months of issue.

Directors and Officers of the Society will **not** be responsible for the loss or damage of the exhibits.

In the event a business donating a special prize goes bankrupt and cannot supply the prize, the Society will award a prize of equal value.

If more than one entry form is used, please number the pages (i.e., page 1 of 4).

Exhibits may be shown for two years only, unless specified except for quilts which may be shown for four consecutive years.

Any person found guilty of violating any part of the rules would forfeit the whole of their prize money.

In the event of a tie in points, the greater number of First place entries shall decide the winner.

Anyone wishing to sell their exhibits must provide their own table and do so outside the Arena after 3:00pm on Saturday.

All exhibits must be made, grown, or tended by the exhibitors, otherwise they will be disqualified.

Prize money will be paid as soon as possible.

The Society will not be held liable for any accident that happens at the Fair.

Livestock Rules

The following rules pertain to the handling, classification, judging, etc. of all livestock at the fair for general and special prizes.

All livestock must be on the fairgrounds by 11:30 am Saturday.

To be eligible to enter livestock in the fair, the exhibitor must:

To be or become a member of the Manitowaning Agricultural Society, submit to the Secretary or other designated Official by 11:30 am Saturday, a completed entry form listing all livestock entered. Entry forms are available from the Society. Completed entry tags must be carried by competitor.

Wherever possible, livestock will be judged in the order they appear in the prize list.

Multiple entries: each major category (i.e., Cattle) is divided into classes and each class may have one or several sections. Exhibitors may enter more than one entry in a given livestock section provided this is not specifically prohibited in the write-up of the class or section in the prize list. Exhibitors may not enter a single entry in more than one section of any class, (This does not apply to breeding herds). Exhibitors may enter an entry in more than one class.

Registration papers: It is not necessary to bring registration papers to the fair on fair day unless they are specifically requested in the write-up of the class or section. However, if requested by the Directors of the Society, registration papers should be available within seven days following the fair.

All exhibitors are asked to exercise care and caution in handling animals on the fair grounds. All driving and riding of animals should be no faster than walking speed unless where required on exhibition in the show ring.

All animals must be tied or confined unless being handled or led by a capable exhibitor.

Horses may be removed from the grounds any time after they are judged.

Any animal entered incorrectly in a class will be permitted to enter the proper class provided that class has not already been judged.

Exhibitors entering purebred stock must file the names and registration numbers in the entry form. For young purebred not yet registered, the names and numbers of the sire and dam are required.

Livestock should be preregistered with the director in charge seven days prior to the fair.

All livestock will be tagged with RFID tags.

Livestock owners should provide proof of liability insurance for the event.

Safety Rules for all Horse Categories

All waivers must be signed and submitted before the rider is mounted.

All exhibitors are asked to exercise care and caution in handling animals on the fair grounds.

No horse shall be ridden faster than a walk unless it is in the show ring.

Please, no stallions allowed on the fairgrounds or in the parade.

All riders under the age of 18 must wear a properly fitting ASTM approved helmet with harness and secure footwear with heel at all times when mounted in the ring as well as on the grounds. Those participants over 18 must wear secure footwear with heel at all times when mounted in the ring as well as on the grounds, helmets are strongly recommended. This dress code will be strictly enforced and will be checked.

Neither sponsors nor the organizing committee, nor the Manitowaning Agricultural Society will be held responsible for any damage, injury or loss to persons, property or horses of the exhibitors or the spectators.

Every horse competitor MUST HAVE A MEMBERSHIP. Admission must also be paid at the gate. For more information, contact Director in Charge

All exhibitors must have proof of liability insurance.

Baby Photo Contest

Entry period is from July 1 to August 31 each year.

Entry forms available at the Assiginack Municipal Office, any of Manitowaning Fall Fair volunteers or local stores.

Maximum 12 participants for Baby Photo contest. Each child will be judged by the public attending the fair based on a picture of child provided by parent or guardian.

1. The picture of child should be NO LARGER than 4x6 inches with NO OTHER PERSON OR ANIMAL INCLUDED. Do not mount photo. Write the baby's name on back of the photo in case the photo and entry form get separated.
2. No names will be attached to the photo during the judging process.
3. There will be three age categories 0-12 Months, 13 -24 Months, 25 - 36 Months old.
4. Highest number of votes will be declared the winner.
5. Each vote costs 25 cents to a maximum of 8 votes, \$2.00 per person, to ensure every child an equal chance. Anything over \$2.00 will be considered a donation to fair. For example, a ten-dollar bill in the jar, only \$2.00 will be counted towards that baby and the rest will be a donation to the fair.
6. The judging starts with opening of fair on Friday night and ends on Saturday at 2 pm.
7. Any person at the fair is eligible to vote.
8. BABIES ENTERED MUST BE PRESENT SATURDAY at 2 pm in arena.
9. All money raised except that awarded for prizes will be donated to fair.
10. Only babies participating in the Photo Contest will receive a gift bag.

2. Quilts to be considered to OAAS Competition **must be a minimum of 324” in perimeter.**
3. The quilt section will be judged for the Grand Champion Quilt (see rules that follow).
4. Quilts may be shown for four (4) years.
5. All quilts not solely made, pieced, and quilted by the exhibitor must be indicated on the entry tag, as these are eligible for local fair competition only.
6. Any items that are a pair must be identical.
7. **If name label is used, it must be covered.**

Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS)

Annual Hand Quilted Championship Competition

Eligibility Rules and Regulations: please refer to the OAAS page for the rules for quilts.

- A. Entries must be solely made and hand quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local OAAS fair to be eligible for this competition.
- B. Entry quilts must have a minimum perimeter of 324”/823cm (smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next level of competition).
- C. The winner’s name and pattern to be displayed at the Fair on a sign provided by OAAS.
- D. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A provincial Grand Champion Quilt will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention.
- E. Upon making an entry into the OAAS Quilt Competition, the exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
- F. The winning OAAS Champion Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or Convention OAAS competitions.

3. The quilt section will be judged for the Grand Champion Quilt (see rules that follow).
4. Quilts may be shown for four (4) years.
5. All quilts not solely made, pieced, and quilted by the exhibitor must be indicated on the entry tag, as these are eligible for local fair competition only.
6. Any items that are a pair must be identical.
7. **If name label is used, it must be covered.**

Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS)

Annual Machine-Quilting Championship Competition

Eligibility Rules and Regulations

- A. Entries must be solely made and hand quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local OAAS fair to be eligible for this competition.
- B. Entry quilts must have a minimum perimeter of 324"/823cm (smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next level of competition).
- C. The winner's name and pattern to be displayed at the Fair on a sign provided by OAAS.
- D. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A provincial Grand Champion Quilt will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention.
- E. Upon making an entry into the OAAS Quilt Competition, the exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
- F. The winning OAAS Champion Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or Convention OAAS competitions.
- G. Article must have visible machine quilting.

Local Fair Competitions:

1. Each local fair is entitled to send only one Grand Champion Machine-Quilted Article, judged best of show of all eligible machine quilted articles to the district Competition. If any entry wins Grand Champion or Best of Show of all eligible machine-quilted articles at more than one fair, the other fairs at which this item was entered and won should enter their Reserve Champion or Second Best of Show of eligible machine-quilted articles in the District Competition. NOTE: If an exhibitor wins Grand Champion or Best of Show of all eligible machine-quilted classes at other than their own fair, or at more than one fair, the exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest their home address as the one from which the item will be sent to the District Competition.

2. An exhibitor who wins more than one Best of Show title with a different machine-quilted article at different fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning article to compete at the District Competition.
3. Local Homecraft Divisions are requested to judge a Grand Champion or Best of Show of all eligible machine-quilted articles, as well as a Reserve Champion or Second Best of Show of eligible machine-quilted articles.

The Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion are judged from all first and second prize eligible machine-quilted articles.
